RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Entry Forms will be accepted until 8.00pm on Thursday prior to the show. The Committee are entitled to inspect the garden of any exhibitor previous to the Show to make sure that entries are grown by the exhibitor.
NO LATE ENTRIES PLEASE.
2. All exhibits must be staged and ready for judging by 10a.m. on Show Day.
3. Prize giving will take place at approx 3.45pm. All exhibits to remain in place until after 4.15pm.
4. A limited number of Vases are available, otherwise exhibitors find own trays etc.
5. All exhibits must be grown or made by the exhibitor or be in their possession for three months before the show.
6. The room will be cleared at 10.00am on Show Day of persons except Judges and Officials authorised by the Committee.
7. The Judges have power to test any exhibit, to with-hold or diminish a prize and to disqualify any exhibitor who, in their opinion, shows more than one plant in a pot.
8. The Show will be open to the Public from 1.00pm to 4.00pm
Admission 50p, Children Free.
9. Entrance Fee 10p each entry, except in Children's Section, 5p each entry.
10. Prizes will be paid out in the room in the afternoon. Afterwards any outstanding claim may be made to the Treasurer up to September 20th after which all claims will be forfeited.
11. The Committee will not be responsible for the wrong staging of any article.
12. In all cases the Judges' decision will be final.
13. The Committee have power to refuse any entry.
14. Any exhibitor sending more entries than they have paid for in any class will be disqualified from winning any prize in that class.
15. The room will be open to receive exhibits on the evening before the Show from 7.00pm until 9.30pm and from 7.00am to 10.00am on the day of the Show.
16. All exhibits must be removed by 5pm or they will be disposed of.
17. The Committee accept no responsibility for any exhibit, or personal belongings
18. Dahlia classes judged according to current National Dahlia Society Rules.
19. Exhibitors are asked to please name variety, if known, for visitors interest.
20. A Local exhibitor is a resident within 5 miles of Ingleborough Community Centre.

Natural plant material is any vegetable matter. It includes fresh, dried, garden, wild or made up plant materials, flowers foliage, vegetable or sea-weed. All may be additionally coloured.

Garden News Top Vase Class Rules

(See Class 37)

1. This is an Open Class for a mixed vase of flowers between 5 & 10 stems being a minimum of two different kinds of plants different varieties of the same plant do **NOT** qualify
2. The display to be viewed from all directions and Judged out of 35 points 25 for colour form condition quality and freshness & 10 for overall presentation & effect. Judging to be to normal Royal Horticultural Society Rules.
3. No marks awarded for the vase it may be any size shape or material and be in proportion to the display which must be flowers only. **NO** seed heads or berries allowed.
4. Oasis or other packaging allowed but no other accessories or additional foliage beyond that naturally growing from the stems.
5. Only fresh home grown flowers can be used in the vase. No dried or silk flowers are allowed.
6. The winner of the Garden News Top Vase Class to receive a Garden News Certificate & a £10 Mr. Fothergill's seed voucher.
The Runner-up will receive a £5 Mr. Fothergill's seed voucher.
Third prize will receive a £3 Mr. Fothergill's seed voucher.

Notice for Exhibitors & Judges Of Top Vase Class

A vase is any vessel used to hold cut flowers & is taller than it's width at the widest point.

The Garden New Top Vase Class is open to anyone not just for regular showers in single species Classes.

Judges should bear in mind that entries may not come from regular exhibitors and use their discretion.

Judges should note the display has to be viewed all round.

The points awarded to be marked by Judge on exhibitors cards.

THE WESTMORLAND AND NORTH LANCASHIRE FEDERATION OF HORTICULTURAL SHOWS SOCIETIES TROPHIES

The Federation is awarding two trophies, one for exhibitor gaining most points in the flower classes and one for exhibitor gaining most points in the vegetable classes.

Exhibitors may choose, after judging, four classes in the Open Flower Classes (excluding miniature flower arrangement) and four Classes in the Open Vegetable Classes from not more than six shows of the Federation Societies to count towards Championship Points (4, 2, 1 Blue Ribbon 5.) Exhibitors who wish to have their points entered for the Trophy Competitions should notify the Secretary.

There will also be Awards for 2nd, & 3rd Winners in both sections.
